For this project, the District is both the lead agency and the applicant in the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process. They are a <u>self-certifying</u> agency, meaning the BCHD BoD decides if the Draft Environmental Impact Report complies with the legal requirements of CEQA.

The purpose of the DEIR is to flesh out all environmental concerns with the construction, operation and design of the project. Providing effective comments is one of the most important ways to change the project. You have the right to comment on the entire document. If you don't comment, you give up many of your rights to address inadequacies in the future.

The "**Wall of BCHD PR**" and media blitz started *in force* with the release of the DEIR on March 10. While they are banking on idyllic renderings and "reader's digest" highlights being all folks read, it glosses over many important parts – the devil is in the details. Do not assume BCHD and Wood Environmental know everything about your neighborhood. Point out any problems or issues in the document. Comments are due June 10.

Urge decision-makers and the public to look behind the curtain. Informing the decision-makers and elected officials during the 90-day period is critical. The BCHD is required to respond adequately to substantive issues raised prior to the final certification of the final EIR.

DEIR – First-look example – Aesthetics

- TALLER The proposed 6-story+ structure, now 103 ft. tall, will be the 3rd tallest building in the Beach Cities. However, the property site already sits 30.5 ft. high above homes in all directions - making it 133.5 ft. above street level. (Ref. p. 231 of DEIR pdf, Sec. 3-1, Aesthetics, p. 3.1-33).
- 2. TRANSPARENT? The six key viewing locations (KVLs) provided are insufficient and more should be studied. All conclusions that they have made must be based on evidence. Ask that they study additional KVLs. For example, in the DEIR, the RCFE height now rises ~20 ft. higher than in the June 2020 plan (103 ft. vs. ~83 ft.). Wood suggests that an alternative, reducing the height by ~ 20 ft. would take it's rating from the highest potentially "significant" impact to a "less than significant" impact from this vantage point (see below). Isn't that like a store marking up prices by 20% just before advertising a 20% sale? (Ref. p. 233 of DEIR pdf, Sec. 3.1, ~Aesthetics, p. 3.1 -36).
- 3. **SKEWED VIEWS -** One of the six key viewing locations (KVLs) provided is from 190th and Flagler. The views chosen are public views from the more innocuous locations. From this elevation and distance (below), the RCFE looks lower than street level though it is raised on a 30 ft. hill.

Also completely missing KVLs are views from of the massive parking structure for Phase 2, since they went to a "programmatic" design.
